RAAC inspections The first round of specialist surveys, to determine if Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC) is present in our buildings will start on **Monday (21 August)**. The following locations will be visited over the course of the working week:

We apologise for the short notice. The national survey programme is moving faster than expected; we thank you in advance for your patience and support for the survey team. We expect to get more notice of future inspections and we will keep you updated via this brief. Bed Base Review – project update The Chief Executive Team approved proposals from the Project Board at their meeting at the start of August. In summary these are:

- To take a staged approach to increasing bed capacity in ARI Stage 1a aims to create 40 additional, permanent, fully staffed beds this winter.
- Work will start immediately to determine what is needed to deliver this the planning of staff recruitment, equipment requirements, supporting services, etc
- Development, at pace, of effectiveness and performance measurements for Stage 1a

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The steps in stage 1a are intended to minimise corridor care and start reducing the number of patients being boarded into other wards during the winter period. The additional beds are likely to be focused in the MUSC (Medicine & Unscheduled Care) portfolio, exact details are still being developed. There is committed funding for the additional staffing requirements, including support services and equipment, and we are currently developing the workforce plan. Recruitment for the additional posts required will commence in the next few weeks.

The next stage of the project, Stage 1b, will begin in March 2024 which will aim to add a further 34 beds to the system. A further 46 beds will then be added in 2 stages by June 2025, giving a total of 120 additional beds.
