
COVID-19Brief



Here is the brief for Thursday 31 December 2020.

COVID infections in Scotland The number of infections in Scotland has hit another record high – **2622** – and we have set a new record in Grampian of **260** detected cases. The local data is shown below. If you click <u>here</u> you can visit the Public Health Scotland website, which includes neighbourhood figures for all local authority areas in Scotland. Please note this data will not be updated between 1-4 January.



Contact tracing summary The last day of the year seems like an appropriate time to be looking back at the work of the contact tracing team. The first cases were reported to the new Case Management System on 22 June, although many cases had been dealt with in the few months before the new system came in to use. However, since 22 June we have dealt with 6,055 index cases and 22,864 of their close contacts, an average of 3.8 contacts per case, although some cases have had over 50 contacts. This means that the team has spoken to almost 5% of the population of Grampian. If - despite repeated 'phone calls, text messages and other ways of trying to get in touch with people - it proves impossible to get a response the cases or contacts are recorded as 'failed'. Remarkably, out of all of the cases and contacts reported to us we have only 'failed' 30 index cases and 86 close contacts, 0.5% and 0.4% respectively. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the contact tracers and their amazing team leaders

Use of Fluid Resistant Surgical Masks (FRSMs) FRSMs are mandatory for inpatients unless they are exempt, or care is compromised.

- To maximise patient & staff safety, and minimise COVID-19 transmission opportunities, the use of fluid resistant surgical face masks (FRSMs) by inpatients was recently extended.
- FRSMs should now have been implemented for all inpatients (including children age 5 and over), within the amber and red & green pathway, unless it is intolerable or causes the delivery of care to be compromised.
- Within the care environment these can be removed by patients in the following situations:
 - within single rooms when they are the sole occupant, e.g., staff are not in attendance / providing care
 - · for sleeping or when eating, drinking or showering
- The use of a surgical facemask is recommended (if tolerated), for transfers between **all** pathways (red, amber and green) to minimise the dispersal of respiratory secretions and reduce environmental contamination.
